Definitions	Close contact	All	High	Medium	<p>A close contact can be:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Anyone who lives in the same household as someone with Coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms or who has tested positive for Coronavirus (COVID-19) • Anyone who has had any of the following types of contact with someone who has tested positive for Coronavirus (COVID-19) with a PCR or LFD test: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Face-to-face contact including being coughed on or having a face-to-face conversation within one metre ○ Been within one metre for one minute or longer without face-to-face contact ○ Been within 2 metres of someone for more than 15 minutes (either as a one-off contact, or added up together over one day) ○ Travelled in the same vehicle
	Contact	All	Medium	Low	<p>A contact is a person who has been close to someone who has tested positive for Coronavirus (COVID-19). You can be a contact any time from 2 days before the person who tested positive developed their symptoms (or, if they did not have any symptoms, from 2 days before the date their positive test was taken), and up to 10 days after, as this is when they can pass the infection on to others.</p>
	Face covering	All	Medium	Low	<p>A face covering is something which safely covers the nose and mouth. You can buy reusable or single-use face coverings. You may also use a scarf, bandana, religious garment or hand-made cloth covering but these must securely fit round the side of the face. Face coverings are not classified as PPE (personal protective equipment).</p>

Reason for full opening during mandatory school lockdown	The Science	All	High	Low	<p>Taken from Government guidance:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To reinstate face-to-face provision for all students • The NHS Test and Trace system is up and running with both staff and student participation • Severity of disease in children - there is high scientific confidence that children of all ages have less severe symptoms than adults if they contract Coronavirus (COVID-19) • The Office of National Statistics analysis on Coronavirus (COVID-19) related deaths linked to occupations suggest that staff in educational settings tend not to be at any greater risk from the disease than many other occupations. • There is no evidence that children transmit the disease any more than adults • The Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health has made clear that the overwhelming majority of children and young people still have no symptoms or very mild illness only • Given the improved position, the balance of risk is now overwhelmingly in favour of children returning to school • For the vast majority of children, the benefits of being back in school far outweigh the very low risk from Coronavirus (COVID-19) • Returning to school is also vital for their educational progress, for their wellbeing, and for their wider development

Reason for full opening during mandatory school lockdown	The Science	All	High	Low	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • More is understood about the measures that need to be in place to create safer environments in schools • Implementing the system of controls creates a safer environment for students and staff where the risk of transmission of infection is substantially reduced • Current evidence suggests that these measures are still the right ones to take • As from the start of the spring term, a phased programme of mass asymptomatic testing to take place in school and colleges; this will change to 'home testing' from start of summer term. • As from 01/03/2021 all households with children of school age able to get 2 rapid COVID-19 tests per person per week • As from 09/04/2021 Twice weekly rapid testing to be available to everyone in England • Round 4 of the Schools Infection Survey (SIS) shows a significant drop in the number of secondary school pupils and staff testing positive for Coronavirus (COVID-19). <p>For more information refer to the 'Statement from the UK Chief Medical Officers on schools and childcare reopening', the 'Study finds very low numbers of COVID-19 outbreaks in schools', 'COVID-19 in schools: study shows drop in infections', and Government guidance listed above.</p>
Remote provision	Controlling the transmission rate of Coronavirus (COVID-19)	All	Low	Low	Remote provision with 'live lessons' to be maintained for use in the event of a phased return, students self-isolating and/or local lockdown; if only a few students involved they will be advised to follow BBC Bitesize and Oak National Academy timetable; School to keep a record of, and monitor engagement with remote provision.

Remote provision	Controlling the transmission rate of Coronavirus (COVID-19)	All	Low	Low	School to put systems in place to keep in contact with students self-isolating, offer pastoral support, and check they are able to access education support; information for students, parents and carers about remote education provision published on School website; all participants, including staff and students, should take regular breaks from using Display Screen Equipment (DSE); HSE recommends short, frequent breaks of 5-10 minutes every 50-60 minutes of continuous screen and/or keyboard work are preferable to occasional longer breaks; breaks should be taken away from the screen.

Attendance	Controlling the transmission rate of Coronavirus (COVID-19)	Students	High	Low	If someone who is self-isolating, because they have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for Coronavirus (COVID-19), starts to feel unwell and gets a test for Coronavirus themselves, and the test delivers a negative result, they must remain in isolation for the remainder of the 10-day isolation period; this is because they could still develop Coronavirus (COVID-19) within the remaining days; if the test result is positive, they should inform the Head teacher immediately, and should isolate from the day of onset of their symptoms and at least the following 10 full days (which could mean the self-isolation ends before or after the original 10-day isolation period); their household should self-isolate starting from when the symptomatic person first had symptoms and the next 10 full days; absences should be reported in the usual manner; School should continue to inform social workers where children with a social worker do not attend; School to resume taking attendance registers and continue to complete the online Educational Setting Status form which gives the Department for Education daily updates on how many children and staff are attending.
